Welcome to the 2011 issue of the St Andrews Journal of Art History and Museum Studies. The nine articles featured in this edition cover a broad range of subjects, including Finnish 'construction worker' paintings; unusual vernacular imagery on English medieval misericords; historical accuracy in the creation of costumes for twentieth century productions of The School for Scandal; the representation of guardian angels in sixteenth century Venice; Siamese royalty's portrayal through photography; the journey of an adventurous traveller in the Middle and Near East; and the result of research into a watercolour painting of a previously misidentified man.
