

Frederika Adam attended the University of Michigan and graduated in 1993 with a B.A. in Art History and Fine Arts. She then came to St. Andrews for an M.Litt. degree, which was conferred in 1996. Her thesis was entitled Paestum and the Grand Tour: The Sketchbooks of Soane and Turner.

Ian Holgate graduated with a B.A. (Hons) from the University of East Anglia in 1993. He continued his study of Art History at St. Andrews and graduated with an M.Litt. in 1995. He remains here in pursuit of a Ph.D. His paper on Giovanni d'Alemagna is part of his research on Early Quattrocento patronage links between Venice and Padua.

Robert A. Presently she is the Curator of the Photographic Archives at the Peabody Museum of Archaeology and Ethnology at Harvard University in Cambridge, MA.

In January 1996. she extended her research on the "Wrights' Incorporation of Perth and Perth Furniture. 1700-1840" and plans to complete the doctoral thesis in June 1998.

Carol Richardson, Ph.D. began her university career at St. Andrews as an undergraduate and earned an M.A. (Hons) in Art History in 1990.
